# Reward based training using voice, cuddles \& treats <br> by Ginny Legh 

Reward based training produces a happy dog who really wants to work with you.
Rewards come in many guises such as voice, pats \& cuddles, food \& toys.
If your boss paid you peanuts instead of \$'s, you'd tell them to go jump in the lake \& find a new job with a more realistic boss, wouldn't you?
Dogs behave in a similar way when you don't pay them properly for working well.

- They stop listening to you \& no longer pay attention
- They start looking around for something more interesting to do
- They put their nose down \& start sniffing the ground or pick up a stick to chew on
- They move away from you \& start to pull on the lead, etc

So how can you 'pay' your dog appropriately?
Your voice is the one of the best treats you can give your dog. A happy, enthusiastic 'yes' can instantly mark the moment when the dog did the right thing. This, of course, is followed by a treat in the early stages of training \& when training something new.
Once the dog knows the exercise, you can reward with the 'yes' every time they do it correctly \& randomise the giving of treats (remember a particularly good performance can also earn a jackpot!). All types of reward must be given within 3 seconds of the wanted behaviour occurring or the dog doesn't know what he's being rewarded for.
Constant repetition of a word will result in the dog tuning out. For example don't keep saying "sit', use your hands to show what you want or a treat to lure them into position.
Choose what your dog considers high value treat foods. Try all of the following cooked beef sausages, left over lean lamb or beef, cheese, salami, cabanossi, BBQ chicken or soft commercial treats such as Chicken Chunkers. Mix them up as well.
Food treats should be soft \& tiny, really tiny - no bigger than your little finger nail. You can reward your dog with 2-3 treats of this size \& wow! they've hit the jackpot.
Talking of jackpots - if your dog does something really well, stop \& reward him with your voice \& your hands \& feed 5-6 treats in quick succession. Attach the word 'jackpot' to this performance - your pup will soon learn the meaning of the word!
Avoid using hard treats such as kibble \& dried liver or beef treats as puppies take too long to chew them \& everything stops until 'l've finished this bit!' If they gulp the treat they can choke on it \& remember, their everyday kibble is extremely boring!
When training puppies, we advise using lots of food treats. In the first few lessons you will have learned to use treats, your 'happy' voice \& 'soft touch' hands to lure your puppy into doing the chosen exercise.
As you progress you will stop luring, but have tiny treats always at the ready \& give them generously. You will then start to randomise the giving of treats \& intersperse it with voice rewards only, in other words you'll keep the dog guessing as to when the next treat will appear!!

## Play it safe! 5 rules to follow when choosing dog toys

Rule 1. Choose the right kind of toys for your dog's breed \& size. The main rules are the toy should be (a) large enough so it can't lodge in the mouth or be caught in the throat, (b) has no pointed or sharp components \& (c) is made of non toxic materials. Rule 2. Never give him old slippers, shoes or clothes to chew on, he won't know (or care about!) the difference between old or new.
Rule 3 Don't give him a heap of toys at the same time or he may think everything that is thrown on the ground or floor is for him \& can be chewed up.
Rule 4. Don't think all baby toys are suitable for your dog. This is especially so for puppies, because, when they're teething, their canine teeth are far more piercing than any human teeth. They may chew off \& swallow pieces of the toy which may not be digestible \& can cause a bowel obstruction (a very costly veterinary emergency!!). Rule 5. Although most dogs love stuffed toys, they're not ideal dog toys. Even though there are some exceptional dogs that will not destroy stuffed toys, most will rip the plastic nose \& eyes or the stuffed ears off \& swallow them. These are often risky \& indigestible items, resulting in a very unpleasant visit to the vet for both you \& your dog. Only let them let them play with stuffed toys when you're with them.

## ‘Leave it’!!!

Is your pup the 'one word from me \& he does exactly what he wants' type?
Is he aggressive towards other dogs \& other animals such as cats?
Is he the local garbage guts, who loves to eat \& roll in the most horrible, smelly things? Does he steal your best shoes \& run off with them saying 'catch me if you can!'

The 'leave it' command can make a huge difference in all these situations 'Leave it' is taught the same way as every other exercise - with reward based training. Step one is to get your dog to realise 'leave it' means treats, praise \& pats are coming. Sit your dog \& put a small food treat on the ground about half a metre away. Stand beside him \& tell your dog in a firm (but non aggressive voice) to 'leave it'. Count to 5 \& if your dog sits \& waits, then tell him 'eat' or 'take' \& immediately praise him with lots of pats, hugs \& another couple of treats.
Practise this at least twice daily \& within a week your dog will happily 'leave’ whatever you put in front of him because he knows a reward treat \& praise is coming.
If he doesn't sit still the first few times, you have move really quickly \& grab the treat off the floor before he gets to it, whilst saying 'ooh ooh'. Then repeat 'sit' \& start again.
You can use his dinner as extra practice but make sure you do the exercise in the house, in the garden, in the park \& even in the car because you want 'leave it' to work no matter where you are, not just where he is normally fed.

The 'leave it' cue can be very successfully linked with the 'come' cue.
In other words, if your dog is showing aggression towards another dog or running off with your shoe, you tell him 'leave it' then say 'come'. He is used to having a 5 second delay after the 'leave it' \& knows the 'come' always produces rewards so he will drop whatever he is doing \& come to you. The problem situation is solved \& yet the whole exercise was a positive experience $\&$ no harsh words or actions by you were required.

# Basic obedience is the bottom-line essential for every activity involving dogs 




Sit, down \& stand. Normally done beside your left leg in the heel position.
One exception being sit in front on recall.


Stay. The dog is placed in a sit, down or stand position. The handler leaves to the required distance.
The exercise is done as a group, as in obedience trials or one-on-one, as in stand for examination.


## After completing the basics what else can I do with my dog?

We encourage all members to continue training at the Club after completing the first few weeks even if only to continue the socialisation of your dogs \& meet new friends.
We provide instruction in Obedience, Rally Obedience, Agility, Dances With Dogs \& Gun Dog training.
There are a number of other options such as Herding, Earthdog Tests, Endurance Tests \& Flyball but these are not taught at NSDTC.

## When can I start doing these more challenging activities?

You are already doing all the basic \& essential exercises in class.
In Advanced First \& Advanced Puppy classes you will find your dog's concentration span is often very short \& you may only get a limited response - a few steps of good heeling, a quick sit or down is a great achievement \& needs maximum reward.

Don't despair when your dog suddenly loses concentration \& seems to have forgotten all they've ever learned. Go \& do something completely different for few moments before returning to training. Finish the session with an exercise you are sure the dog can do successfully, so you can praise \& reward them liberally.
With many, many short training sessions the wanted behaviours will become the norm \& you'll wonder why you ever thought you'd never succeed.
In the early stages you need to practise in quiet surroundings with the least number of distractions. (NB. Sometimes your dog will be distracted during class, but remember, in class, we are really training \& showing you how to train your dog). Once the basics are established, it is time to start practising in other places with more \& varied distractions.
Once you are promoted to 2 nd Class you will be ready to join the Rally Obedience training sessions held on Monday nights from 7.00pm. (Contact Ginny Legh 9489 1554)
When you reach 3rd Class you'll be encouraged to get ready to compete in the Ku-ring-gai K9 Award (KK9). This is an in-house test of basic manners \& obedience. We hold the test twice each year (read about the Award in your Club Handbook).

You can start Agility once your dog is reasonably competent in the 3rd Class, (so long as your dog is over 12 months old). Agility is on Saturdays from 9.00 - noon. Your dog will need to pass our basic obedience \& temperament test before starting Agility. The test is done by one of the Senior Agility Instructors.
When you reach 4th Class you have a number of options -
Trial Learners Group - for those who wish to enter Obedience Trials at the CCD (Community Companion Dog) level but who are not yet ready to trial.
Triallers Group - for those who, on being tested by one of our Dogs NSW Judges or an experienced CCD/CD instructor in the monthly Mock Trial Ring, can prove they are ready to trial or who need to polish up on the finer points \& learn more about ring craft.
Fun Fourth - for those who never wish to enter a trial ring but who want to continue their training for fun. The class will include Obedience, Rally O \& a weekly pick of one of the following - trick training, dog dancing, gundog work, agility, KK9, marching to music, tracking. etc.

## A Healthy Dog <br> is <br> a Happy Dog

## Do you have an itchy bitch or a desperate dog?

In the last few months many owners have been dealing with itchy dogs \& all the problems that are associated with the misery it causes for the dogs \& their owners.
There are numerous causes \& reasons for irritated skin conditions.
Some are obvious, such as fleas, grass ticks \& allergies to various plants, the best known of these being the sap from wandering jew \& the sticky pollen from paspalum grass.

Humidity often increases itchiness, especially if the dog has hypersensitive skin.
Some dogs will develop 'hot spots', a form of moist dermatitis. The dog will be very itchy, typically turning frantically as if stung by an insect \& will bite \& scratch at the affected area. When you check the area you'll find a weeping sore which may already be hairless. Hot spots grow in size almost before your eyes if left untreated. The most important thing is to dry them out quickly, stop the dog biting or licking the spot \& get them to the vet for appropriate treatment.
We, as owners, can deal with the obvious problems such as fleas \& plant allergies by ensuring our dogs are properly protected with appropriate topical medications, regular grooming, bathing \& inspection of the dog's skin or adequate weed control.
All other skin problems should be dealt with by your vet. The answer may be a simple one but there are many serious conditions associated with itchy skin that can only be managed by a professional.

## Kennel cough (canine infectious tracheobronchitis)

This is a highly infectious disease affecting the trachea (wind pipe) \& causes a severe productive or non-productive cough.

## Signs

- Persistent coughing as if something is caught in the throat
- Sometimes coughing in a spasm-like way. Often white frothy foam is produced
- There may be watery discharge from the eyes
- Dogs can, otherwise, appear bright \& well, appetite is usually normal
- It is rarely fatal \& then only with heart or respiratory compromised dogs.
~ The annual C5 vaccination provides some protection but is not $100 \%$ effective.
~ Vaccination reduces the severity \& the risk of contracting kennel cough.
~ It is normally contracted when dogs are in close contact with infected dogs in kennels, at dog shows, in dog training areas, etc., hence the name 'kennel cough'.
~ Infected dogs are often well in themselves despite the cough but pneumonia can sometimes follow.
~ Less severe cases often resolve themselves without treatment but good care \& rest are essential.
$\sim$ If your dog is showing signs of kennel cough it is wise to consult your vet for advice.


## Easter is a great time for humans but.

It's not a safe time for dogs as there are so many yummy chocolate treats around \& often families gather together for Easter egg hunts \& BBQ's.

All types of chocolate or cocoa \& any lollies containing the artificial sweetener, Xylitol, are toxic for dogs \& can be fatal.

Some of the other foods which should never be given to dogs are onions, nuts, grapes, raisins, fatty off cuts of pork, ham or bacon \& cooked bones.

## Paunchy Pooches

Dogs \& humans often share these problems - too much food \& too little exercise.
Obesity can lead to serious conditions like arthritis, pancreatitis, diabetes \& even cardiovascular disease. It can drastically shorten our dog's lives.

## Ways to check if your dog is overweight

- Can you feel each rib when you run your fingers along the ribcage?
- When viewed from above, does your dog have a definite 'waist' behind the ribcage?
- When viewed side on, does your dog's tummy tuck upwards from the bottom of the ribcage to the groin?
- Does your dog have 'love handles' just in front of their hips?

For dogs that are overweight, a proper weight reduction program is essential.

- Firstly, record your dog's starting weight \& then weigh your dog weekly.
- Talk to your vet about a suitable weight reduction diet. There are many specially formulated dry \& canned diets available from your vet.
- With your vet work out what your dog's target weight should be.
- Then feed your dog the amount of food needed for a dog that would weigh $60 \%$ of this target weight. This should see the dog's weight reducing about $3 \%$ per week \& you should achieve your dog's target weight in about 12 weeks.
- The next rule is essential but tough - you know what it is! Never feed titbits \& never feed your dog from the dinner table.
- Make sure your dog doesn't have access to other food sources such as another pet's food \& that is it not sneaking to the neighbour's house for a second course.
- Don't provide free access to food unless you measure the exact amount every day.
- Use food from the daily allowance as reward treats.

Exercise is an essential part of a weight reduction program.

- Burning the calories is vital. It's a great opportunity for you \& your dog to start an exercise program together!
- There are many benefits from exercising your dog in your own back yard by throwing balls \& toys in various different directions. Swimming is also wonderful exercise for dogs if you can organise it.

Be tough with yourself to be kind to your pet.

Dogs must be at least 1 year old \& in Third Class or above to start Agility or Flyball

- NSDTC requires a minimum C3 (distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus) vaccination administered after the age of 12 weeks for all puppies less than 12 months old. Please Note. A delay of two weeks after the final puppy vaccinations is required before puppies are permitted to join classes.
- All adult dogs (over 12 months old) joining or renewing, must have had at least a C3 vaccination administered after 12 months of age. Triennial (3-yearly) C3 vaccination is considered acceptable thereafter.
- Dogs joining or renewing over the age of 4 years that have not had a C3 vaccination in the preceding 3 years must be referred to the Club Vet officer or official nominee.
- Veterinary certificates showing adequate antibody titres* to distemper, hepatitis \& parvovirus will be accepted by NSDTC for all adult dogs as long as they are dated within the preceding 12 months.
*Adequate antibody titres for distemper, hepatitis \& parvovirus are considered to be >1:20
- As Bordetella \& Parainfluenza (both agents causing canine cough) are not generally life threatening to healthy dogs, these vaccinations would be optional, but recommended \& owners are reminded these may be required by boarding kennels.
- All vaccination \& antibody titre certificates must be signed by a registered veterinary surgeon.
- Homeopathic 'vaccinations' will not be accepted.


## PARKING

- Please park on the LEFT of the road as you enter the showground or near the picnic area beside the Douglas Pickering Pavilion.
- The parking area on the right, nearer the Clubhouse, is for 'on duty' Club Members who need to leave their dogs in the car, carry equipment, etc. Thank you.


## CLUB \& USE of GROUND GUIDELINES

These guidelines are for the benefit of all members \& the general public who use St Ives Showground.

- All dogs must be on lead during club training times (except when off lead work is directed by an instructor during class).
- Dog droppings must be cleaned up \& placed in a bin.
- Always wear your name tag.
- The dog rings are a leash free area EXCEPT on Saturdays.
- The main oval may be used for leash free exercise, so long as no other organised event is taking place.
